Now is your time to get pick and choice of these lots, and more especially the front lots; and the good part is we sell our lots so cheap, and another good thing is we have the timber, the rock, the water, in fact everything to make a good town.

It is a well known fact that we have the best farming country in North Alabama. We make corn to sell and cotton to sell and peas and potatoes and peanuts by the thousands of bushels. You can't find another place in the state that will turn us down on the above products; and we believe we have the best water in the world.

We have at Rainsville one large store, a cotton buyer and fine plant of machinery consisting of a saw mill, grist mill, shingle mill and a feed crusher and the best sets of cotton gins in the county. We ginned 800 bales last year.

Another good thing we have at Rainsville is a fine school. We have a nine month school to commence the first Monday in November, taught by Mrs. Susie McCurdy, and she always gives good satisfaction.

Now, if this letter don't go to the waste basket I will write again later on and tell you more about our coming town.
